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CSU Research Fellowships and Senior Research Fellowships

Applications are invited from eligible staff for the new CSU Research Fellowships and Senior Research Fellowships. This is an exciting next step to have the funding and capacity to support these Fellowships. Over a two year period, these Fellowships represent an investment of up to \$3M in our research capacity. The closing date for applications is 4 May 2018.

The Research Fellowships and Senior Research Fellowships are intended to boost research capacity within the university by supporting dedicated research time and providing additional research resources for a number of high-performing individuals. The Fellowships are specifically focused on achieving growth and increased performance towards securing the future strength of research at CSU.

Built on the Research Narrative, the Fellowships also seek to better enable cross-collaboration and multi-disciplinary projects that lie within the research spheres and/or at the intersections of the research spheres. All Fellowships must be in a research area which **aligns to the Research Narrative** and can identify strongly with at least one research sphere.

CSU Research Fellowships will provide funding to support an increased research-focussed workload up to a maximum of 60% FTE which is inclusive of the current research-focussed workload of the eligible staff member as at time of application. There will be up to 10 Research Fellowships awarded. There is no fixed allocation of Fellowships per research sphere.

CSU Senior Research Fellowships will provide funding to support an increased research-focussed workload up to a maximum of 100% FTE which is inclusive of the current research-focussed workload of the eligible staff member as at time of application and is inclusive of a 30% FTE commitment to research leadership in the designated research sphere. There will be up to 2 Senior Research Fellowships per research sphere (up to 6 Fellowships awarded).

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Call for Research Commercialisation EOIs: Discovery Translation Fund at CSU

CSU is part of the Discovery Translation Fund with the Australian National University (ANU) and the University of Canberra (UC). The DTF assists the commercialisation of new technologies and innovations from each university by providing a peer review and evaluation process prior to investment. The goal of

DTF is to help bridge the critical funding gap between discovery research and the commercial development of new technologies or the establishment of new ventures. The DTF provides opportunity for any project with commercial potential across all disciplines and research areas.

Each university is responsible for funding the next step towards commercialisation for research originating within its own institution. All appropriate Intellectual Property (IP) arrangements must be in place with the relevant university. There is no cross-funding of projects. CSU has committed investment of up to \$350,000 per annum to advance the commercialisation of our own research.

Grants can be awarded up to \$50,000 per project, with funding above \$50,000 considered for projects of exceptional commercial potential. Funding above \$50,000 on any one project can only be awarded conditionally and will be accessible only on the demonstration of a significant commercial milestone.

CSU is now calling for Expressions of Interest for consideration by the Evaluation Committee at the May meeting. Interested researchers and research teams will need to submit a completed EOI form to the **CSU DTF Team at innovate@csu.edu.au no later than 1 May.**



Support for national inquiry to break care-to-prison pathway

There's strong support from a Charles Sturt University (CSU) academic for a national review of the child protection laws and processes affecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.



Senior lecturer Dr Katherine McFarlane has welcomed the release of the Australian Law Reform Commission (ALRC) Report, *Pathways to Justice – An Inquiry into the Incarceration Rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples*.

KEY POINTS

- The ALRC Report makes 35 recommendations to reduce the disproportionate incarceration rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and improve community safety.
- Report found that the care-to-prison pathway is a major driver of Indigenous people's involvement with the law.
- One of its recommendations calls for a national inquiry into child protection laws for Indigenous young people.
- Report cites CSU academic Dr Katherine McFarlane's research into the involvement of children in out-of-home care in the NSW criminal justice system.
- The ALRC concluded that the links between the child protection system, juvenile justice and adult incarceration is so strong that the child removal into out-of-home care and juvenile detention could be considered as *key drivers* of adult imprisonment.

CSU named one of top emerging engineering schools in world

A new study commissioned by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology identifies Charles Sturt University as one of the top 4 emerging engineering schools in the world.

- CSU 'completely rethinking what engineering education should look like'.
- CSU will be a benchmark for how MIT supports its own program of reform in undergraduate engineering.
- Other universities in the emerging field: University College London, Singapore University of Technology and Design and University of Technology Delft.



A **report** commissioned by global leader in engineering education and research, Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) has identified Charles Sturt University (CSU) as one of the top four emerging engineering courses in the world and has described the CSU degree as '***completely rethinking what engineering educating should look like***'.

The recognition of **CSU Engineering** is the result of a benchmarking study of global state-of-the-art undergraduate engineering. The study, which was commissioned by MIT's **New Engineering Education Transformation** (NEET) initiative, a program of reform in undergraduate engineering education at the Institute, and authored by Ruth Graham, was released on March 27.

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ANZMAC Mid-Year Doctoral Colloquium 2018, 21-22 June, 2018, Melbourne

The ANZMAC Mid-Year Doctoral Colloquium 2018 is open to doctoral students who are at any stage of their PhD. In recent years, the colloquium has attracted delegates from Australia and overseas, making this a truly international colloquium.

PhD research proposals (5-10 double spaced pages) are due by Monday 30th April.

The cohort size will be small and is designed to provide a high-quality experience with expert feedback and an opportunity to share work-in-progress with like-minded researchers to refine your project and improve progress.

The 2018 mid-year DC also provides participants with the opportunity to attend an integrated meta-analysis workshop (at no extra charge). The ability to conduct a meta-analysis is a valuable skill that can assist with systematic sense-making of existing research and can help to clarify the contribution of new research. The hands-on half-day workshop will introduce participants to the basics of how to:

- Plan, conduct, and document a systematic search of the literature
- Extract the relevant data from research papers
- Convert the extracted data into the metrics required to conduct a meta-analysis
- Conduct a basic meta-analysis
- Test data for basic problems of bias and heterogeneity
- Report meta-analytic findings
