First Nations graphic language

The shape in the middle of the graphic language represents water. Water was chosen as it is unifying – everyone needs water. Water is also part of identity in a broad sense, as a saltwater or freshwater person or group. In many cases water also forms a key part of boundaries for nations, and therefore represents diversity of identity.



Birpai totems

Country, clans, individuals and families have totems. A totem can be a natural object or element, plant, or animal.

Totems are one of the key features of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples' kinship structure. This structure connects people to each other, the land, the ancestors and the Dreaming. Through this kinship structure, the individual has roles, responsibilities and obligations to care for their Gimbay/Minigal/Bakuwi to ensure its survival.

Charles Sturt is honoured the Birpai Aboriginal Local Land Council has graciously allowed us to name the roads and walks on the Port Macquarie campus for Birpai totem animals. We are grateful for the cultural knowledge and contribution of Elders Uncle Bill O'Brien OAM and Dr Aunty Rhonda Birpai/Dhungutti in the selection and description of Birpai totem animals.

Gimbay: totem used for generic clan and nation identities

Mingigal: totem used for personal totem


Bakuwi: totem used for your meat (family/bloodline totems)

Wambuyn - Kangaroo




The gimbay for the Comboyne area


