etween February and March 1955, a photographer visited a number of places around Wagga for a feature called,

"Where Wagga People Work". Some of the places of business he went to were the 2WG Radio Station in Fitzmaurice Street, The Capitol Theatre in Gurwood Street, the Bank of NSW on the corner of

Fitzmaurice and Johnston streets, Sheekey's Cordial Manufacturers on The Esplanade, the Post Office and Telephone Exchange in Fitzmaurice Street, and the Wagga Railway Station.

At the time, the images simply represented Wagga's varying commercial enterprises; for us today, they only highlight how much the business environment has changed in half a century. The 35 photographic negatives made their way into Tom Lennon's own photograph collection, which is held here at the CSU Regional Archives.
