EDITORIAL



It is time for all former students of WAC and CSU Agriculture graduates to have their say on a new name for the WACOBU.

This name change is in response to:

- the need to come up with a name and acronym that makes it more relevant to the agriculture alumni from WAC/RCAE/RMIHE/CSU.
- the current status of agriculture graduates from CSU which sees as many female students as males entering the workforce after their studies.
- Forge closer links between CSU and the CSU alumni.
- the need to significantly increase the current WACOBU scholarship fund to assist under graduates with their education expenses at university.
- the need to also reflect on the significant history of the university from the days of Wagga Agricultural College.

Two formal meetings were held of the current WACOBU committee and an interim committee was elected to move this process forward.

Several acronyms have been proposed and discussed in detail by the interim committee.

A time-table for the change has been adopted and a SurveyMonkey has been emailed to alumni for their response to these proposed names.

Changes underway with WACOBU

Background

After many years of not having regular WACOBU committee meetings, a special meeting of the current committee was held at the Riverine Club, Wagga on August 28.

Attendees were Stu Kanaley, Deb Slinger, Ros Prangnell, John Mahon, Ross Henley, Warwick Nightingale, James Brady, Graeme Worboys and guest Jim Pratley. There was an apology from Craig Whiting.

After a discussion on a wide range of issues with the current structure and function of WACOBU, the relationship between WACOBU and CSU, current agriculture courses at CSU and male and female graduate numbers, a number of proposals were made to set a path forward with the organisation.

- 1. An AGM of WACOBU was planned at the Wagga DPI Conference Room on Tuesday 8/10/2024 at 4pm, with zoom access available.
- 2. Prior to that meeting a notice was to be sent out to members, the Wagga Agricultural Club and CSU Alumni advising them of this meeting and welcome input.
- 3. The main focal points for that meeting were:
- ** The need to change the name from WACOBU to a more relevant name that reflects the current graduates of CSU Agriculture courses.
- ** Renew the relationship between the group and the current management of the University and its Alumni and utilising Alumni staff to assist WACOBU.
- ** The need to have a strong Alumni into the future as the University is providing one in four agriculture graduates in Australia.
- ** The need to build up a corpus fund through CSU via sponsorship or donations to ensure scholarship support for agriculture students in the future.
- ** Forge closer links to the current students via the Wagga Agriculture Club a very proactive group at CSU, Wagga Ag Rugby and WAC Netball.

Prior to the AGM Deb Slinger organised the meeting room, business items for the AGM were forwarded to Graeme Worboys to produce a notice for the meeting, which was distributed to members, CSU Alumni and Wagga Agricultural Club members.

Jim Pratley was asked to provide a summary on the significance of CSU in providing graduates for the agriculture sector which will be included in the meeting notice to help gather support.

Committee members were to seek support from other members for this meeting.

Jim Pratley's input

As you may know I have been at the forefront of promoting agriculture education to prospective students based on the buoyant job market and shortage of graduates.

As it stands now CSU turns out about 1 in 5 of agriculture graduates nationally and I would like to see that maintained.

There are 13 universities providing undergraduate students in agriculture and related courses according to the official records.

Enrolments across all total 3400 – with over 800 (1 in 4) coming from CSU - something we can be immensely proud of.

It follows that we need to provide financial support to many students as it is now very expensive to be an undergraduate.

There are quite a few scholarships available at the moment of varying value and questionable longevity.

One of those is the WACOBU scholarship for about \$3000, about the lowest value scholar-ship offered.

There was a fundraiser at some time in the past which produced a corpus fund. It generates the interest that provides this scholarship. I understand the corpus fund is currently about \$50,000.

What I would like to do is to use the existing corpus as a base and build it to at least \$1million or preferably more.

The university guarantees 6% interest for 15 years and so \$1 million would provide around eight scholarships annually of \$8,000.

I plan to go through the alumni to start with, and through contacts I have for various years, to spread the word and ask for funds to be deposited in the corpus account.

Any companies, that graduates have worked for, might also kick the tin given that it is they who need these graduates. An annual input for 5 years is an option.

The amounts are whatever people can afford or would like to do - somewhere between \$100 and \$1,000,000 works.

I will be contributing by putting in \$5000 and challenge people to match or beat it. If there are 20 other donors that will also do this I will commit another \$5000.

I have already established a corpus fund for Indigenous students to study agriculture and at the moment it has about \$60,000 in it with a target of \$1 million also.

At 6% interest it will provide about seven or eight scholarships each year at \$8000 per year each.

We need to get to \$150,000 in corpus to generate one \$8000 scholarship per year. I have already committed significantly more than \$5000 to this corpus.

There are two other issues - the current minders of the corpus will need to be encouraged to embrace the plan and it is an opportunity to update the name.

WACOBU doesn't work as we now have more females than males in the courses.

I think we need to recognise that it is 35 years since CSU has existed and 48 years since WAC hasn't.

I have spent almost all my career in this place. I would like this as a legacy that perpetuates our courses and place in agriculture.

This is done with the best of intentions for the long term.

I also acknowledge the custodians of the current corpus - Stuart Kanaley in particular is always around to represent WACOBU.

WACOBU AGM

The WACOBU AGM was held on Tuesday 8.10.24 at the NSW DPI Conference Room at Wagga.

Attendees were: Deb Slinger, Georgia Smith, Stu Kanaley, Jock Munro, Craig Whiting, Pos Prangnell, John Mahon, Sean Roberts, Tom Heilman, Graeme Worboys, Jim Pratley (visitor) with Video Link attendees Brittany Bickford, Danny Parnell, Mike Thew, Ross O'Shea, Mike Oldfield, Michelle Oldfield, Hedy Bryant, Charlie Bell, Ian Johnson, Ross Henley and Justin Williams (CSU Advancement).

Apologies were received from James Brady, Jenny Bradley, Tim Condon and Simon Thompson.

Justin Williams spoke on the CSU Advancement scholarship program and the current dollar values of scholarships offered by a number of private organisations and individuals each year. The current WACOBU Scholarship is valued at \$2000 annually to one student, well below the standard value of \$5000. The relationship between WACOBU and CSU Alumni can be and needs to be strengthened moving forward and Justin offered assistance to make this happen.

Jim Pratley endorsed these comments and asked the group to make the WACOBU organisation all-inclusive and to move forward with CSU in promoting and investing in agriculture.

There was then general discussion on the following issues:

Changing the name of WACOBU

After 50 years of female students at WAC and CSU studying agriculture and with females now representing over 50 per cent of the graduates from CSU Agriculture, the term WACOBU is not representative of the agriculture faculty at the university. To continue a strong Alumni within CSU, which now provides one in five agriculture graduates to the industry Australia wide, this name change is vital to continue this strong legacy well into the future.

After a lengthy discussion from all those present, expressing their views, (including current student Tom Heilman who is president of the Wagga Agricultural Club with 800+ members) it was decided a name change was appropriate.

The committee needed to consult with the broader WACOBU membership and a motion was passed: "That WACOBU members be given the opportunity to vote on a suitable acronym organised by this committee, via SurveyMonkey, to determine this new acronym". Moved Deb Slinger, seconded Ros Prangnell. Carried

Current committee members were asked to provide Deb Slinger at theslingers@bigpond.com by 15.10.24 their suggestions and to canvass their year groups and cohorts for their thoughts.

Establish a Corpus Fund

The current WACOBU annual scholarship (started in 2007) is for one student only and is valued at the lower end of the scholarship spectrum. A CSU fundraiser was held in the past to produce a corpus fund, which aims to build a sizeable resource of \$1 million or more to provide around eight scholarships valued at \$8000 annually to students studying agriculture.

After discussion it was decided that the idea of increasing the value and number of annual scholarships available to agriculture students was of great importance.

Ideas included canvassing past students, their employers, industry organisations and others to raise awareness of the scheme and its benefits for future graduates.

A motion was put "That the current scholarship program be revamped with the aim to increase opportunities for new investment via this corpus fund". Moved John Mahon, seconded Warwick Nightingale. Carried.

Improve relationships with CSU Alumni, the Wagga Agriculture Club and current students

There is a need to improve the relationships between CSU Alumni and the current student body with members of WACOBU to ensure that current CSU management, staff and students are assisting each other in ensuring a strong network between the groups to assist graduates in their future roles in the industry. It was resolved to work through these issues with both CSU Alumni and the Agricultural Club and establish a more formal connection that will benefit all groups.

Election of Office Bearers

Discussion was held on the make-up of the next committee, with suggestions that the current structure could be changed to better fit in with the proposed changes to the organisation and increased interaction with CSU Alumni and the Wagga Agricultural Club.

On this basis an Interim Working Committee was established comprising:

Deb Slinger (Co-ordinator), Stu Kanaley, Georgia Smith, Tom Heilman, Ros Prangnell, Sean Roberts, Brittany Bickford, Ian Johnson, Craig Whiting, Ian Munro, Warwick Nightingale, John Mahon and Graeme Worboys with the right to add others.

Since that Meeting

The interim committee has had a lot of communication between themselves, their WAC class mates and others to determine the most suitable name and acronym for the new organisation.

A time frame has been put forward to plan for this name change by Interim Committee coordinator Deb Slinger with a new name in place by the end of February 2025.

The current name of WACOBU no longer reflects the diversity of our membership, which is now equally male and female, nor has it encompassed the graduate community since 1978, none of whom graduated under the WAC banner.

We are considering a name change for the Union to ensure we stay relevant to all agricultural graduates and your feedback is essential in guiding this decision.

Additionally, we are keen to address the sustainability of the WACOBU Scholarship, which supports one CSU agricultural student annually in their 2nd, 3rd or 4th year on the Wagga Wagga campus.

With your support, we can significantly increase this fund, ensuring that we continue to give back to the next generation of agricultural leaders while preserving the legacy of Wagga Wagga Agricultural College.

We ask that you complete a short survey and provide your thoughts on the proposed name change and the future of our scholarship fund.

Your participation is crucial, as we work to strengthen our Union and leave a lasting impact on our community.

We also want to highlight that the 75th Celebration Dinner is scheduled for 2025, and encourage you to join us in this milestone event.

This will be an opportunity to reflect on our history and look forward to a bright future. We will share further details of this event with you in the new year.



Wagga Campus History

In 1948, the Minister for Agriculture Eddie Graham proposed the establishment of an Agricultural College at Wagga Wagga that offered a three-year Diploma course and in September 1949 the Wagga Wagga Experiment Farm was converted into the Wagga Wagga Agricultural College.

Although the first students attended lectures in March 1949, the official opening and naming of the College did not take place until the September of that year.

Two years earlier, in 1947, the Wagga Wagga Teachers College had been established on a different site in Wagga Wagga (later to become known as 'South Campus') to provide teacher education.

The then School of Agriculture's building 'Doman Hall' was officially opened in April 1964 in response to a dire need for more student accommodation.

This building was demolished in 2018 with an event held to celebrate the history of the building and a book entitled 'Doman' by Sherry Morris was published to acknowledge the important role of the Hall in the college.

During 1971, the Riverina College of Advanced Education (RCAE) was formally established and in January 1972 the Wagga Wagga Teachers College was dissolved and the Riverina College of Advanced Education was established on the site of the Teachers College with Study Centres opened in Albury and Griffith.

In January 1976, the Wagga Wagga Agricultural College was merged with the RCAE and became the School of Agriculture within the college.

During the 1970s, the Council of the RCAE decided to purchase a site adjacent to the existing campus of the Wagga Agricultural College known locally as 'Boorooma' Campus.

During the late 1970s and into the 1980s, a great deal of building development was undertaken at this new site in readiness for the transfer of staff, students and amenities to the new Boorooma and Agricultural campuses north of the Murrumbidgee River, from the old Teachers College campus in the city.

Effective from March 1985, the name of the college was changed to the Riverina-Murray Institute of Higher Education (RMIHE) to better reflect the geographical areas served by the institution, with the two main campuses located at Albury-Wodonga and Wagga Wagga.

In 1989, the Charles Sturt University Act brought together the Riverina Murray Institute of Higher Education and the Mitchell College of Advanced Education at Bathurst to form Charles Sturt University.

The Wagga Wagga Campus became one of the three foundation campuses of Charles Sturt, along with Albury-Wodonga and Bathurst. In late 2017 the former Wagga Wagga Teachers College site (known as 'South Campus') was sold.



The current logo

Our crest draws on Charles Sturt University's original coat of arms and the logos of our predecessor institutions.

The crest is shelld shaped and depicts stylised rivers in the top half, vertical lines in the bottom quarter for the field, and chevrons in the bottom right for books.

The rivers represent Captain Charles Sturt's spirit of exploration and discovery; they symbolise the location of our foundation campuses.

The field is symbolic of our proud agricultural heritage.

The book represents our tradition of learning and inquiry; a seeking for truth, information or knowledge.

ANOTHER MILESTONE IN OUR HISTORY

75 YEARS OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

1949-2024



Prior to 1949 the Wagga Wagga campus dated back to 1892 with the establishment of the Wagga Experiment Farm on about 2,000 acres, which offered vocational agricultural education on the current site of Charles Sturt University.

Initially named the Murrumbidgee Experimental Farm, it was changed to the Wagga Experiment Farm with the first students enrolled at the Experiment Farm in October 1896.

The farm was one of those used by William Farrer who released the first of his rust resistant wheats, the variety "Federation" in 1901, an early maturing wheat that enabled a rapid expansion of wheat growing in Australia.

Farrer had joined the Department in 1898, working mainly at Wagga Wagga but also at Cowra and other experiment farms.

The Wagga Agricultural College grew out of the Experiment Farm in 1949 and the Agricultural Research Institute followed in 1953.

In 1948, the Minister for Agriculture Wagga born Eddie Graham proposed the establishment of an Agricultural College at Wagga Wagga offering a three-year Diploma, and in September 1949 the Wagga Wagga Experiment Farm was converted into the Wagga Wagga Agricultural College.

Although the first students attended lectures in March 1949, the official opening and naming did not take place until September.

Eddie Graham attended both the Lake Albert Public School and the Wagga Wagga Public School, but only for the minimum time required.

After school, Graham gave carpentry a try, but soon left to work on his father's farm "Summer Glen".

He then entered into the butchery trade in 1917 and established his own business, the Marble Arch Butchery.

Graham then moved into the pig stud business, establishing the Kinilibah Stud Farm in 1932.

Graham had also always been active in rural groups and associations. From 1925-41 he had served as President of the Wagga Wagga District Junior Farmers' Club.

He entered State politics in 1941, becoming the Member for Wagga Wagga, and in 1944 the Minister for Agriculture and Food Production within the McKell Labor Government.

Graham served as Minister for a record ten years during which time he initiated many reforms both in the agricultural industry and in tertiary education, where he secured the building of the Wagga Teachers College, the Wagga Technical College and the Wagga Agricultural College.

Graham's contributions to the agricultural industry are well remembered with numerous memorials erected in his honour.

The Graham Block stands at Charles Sturt University and the Graham Centre for Agricultural Innovation is also named after him.

There will be a Formal Dinner in 2025 to recognise this major milestone in the history of WAC.

John Harper awarded an OAM in 2024 Australia Day Honours list

John "China" Harper, founder of "Mate Helping Mate", was one of two men from the NSW South West Slopes region to be recognised for their work in advocating for suicide prevention in the 2024 Australia Day Honours.

John (and Eris Gleeson of Young) were both conferred medals of the Order of Australia for their decades of work in the area of suicide prevention in a region that has seen this tragic outcome on too many occasions.

John formerly from Stockingbingal said that privately he felt the excitement of a small puppy being patted on the head at being conferred an OAM for his service to community health, but publicly he was chuffed an "ordinary Australian" like him would receive the honour.

"This may be awarded by the Governor, but I was nominated by my peers, by committee members, members of the community and I'm slightly overwhelmed at that thought but also very proud that they think I show the characteristics and traits of a person worthy of something like this," he said.

John Harper's own experience of depression gave rise to his own mobilisation in breaking the silence around mental health in rural and regional NSW and his candid approach and messaging now resonates around Australia.

Founder of the Mate Helping Mate network – a self-help program and podcast series which addresses mental health and wellbeing in rural communities – John is dedicated to talking to people about what works (and what doesn't) for helping people struggling in remote and rural communities.

He was also the recipient of a 2008 Pride of Australia Medal for Community Spirit.

Now deputy chair of Temora's Local Health Advisory Committee and staunch supporter of the Rural Outreach Counselling service, his is a life devoted to encouraging mateship and community involvement.

"The reason I advocate is I want to make the world a better place.

"I have a very simple goal – I want my kids, and my kids' kids, to be better people than me and to do that I've got to give them an example.

"It's not just saying it, it's actually doing it, because actions speak louder than words", said John.

Eris Gleeson, originally from Coonamble, moved to Young in the 1970' and is a founding member and chairman of the Hilltops Suicide Prevention Network. Formed in 2007, Eris has noiselessly toiled, with others, to provide positive and lasting support to vulnerable and at-risk people in a community that takes in the small towns and villages in the Hilltops Council area.

David Sloane

A servant of the bush

Wagga Agricultural College has had some esteemed graduates in its history books, with many making a significant contribution to the community in many ways.

One such person is David Sloane, who started his WAC life in 1958 and had a life in rural communities as a church minister for over 50 years.

David has served many rural communities as a minister in the Presbyterian and Uniting Churches since 1971 and has written a book about his life titled "A Journey Under Grace".

Perhaps his studies at Ag College and knowledge of rural people and agriculture helped him prepare for a life of ministry in many country NSW towns for over half a century.

He did survive the WAC student initiation process of diving into wet cow manure and other antics to graduate before he returned home onto the farm.

Growing up at Savernake Station, east of Berrigan in south western NSW, he enjoyed his childhood in the bush and attended the local one-teacher primary school.

He attended Geelong College as a boarder, then Wagga Ag College and returned to Savernake Station before deciding to leave the farm and train to become a teacher.

He studied at Armidale, met his future wife Val and raised three children.

He was ordained a priest in 1971 and joined the Uniting Church after its formation in 1977.

David's parishes included Lockhart, Wangaratta, Berrigan, Henty, Manilla, Barraba, Yass, Dubbo, Coleambally, Darlington Point and Nathalia.

His wife is also a minister and accepted a role in Cobram in 2002.

They both retired in 2008 and have made Corowa their home and still contribute to the church and wider community.

His book, written over three to four years during COVID lockdowns, reflects on his life experiences from his early childhood, based on letters written to him by his mother, diarry entries and journals he had kept.


His time at WAC was an important part of his life, despite the initiations, and instilled in him a love of agriculture, rural life and mateship.


