




Interestingly, there were a number of private greens in existence in

Wagga at various times. In 1929 Harry Lampe had a single rink bowling green, complete with light-ing, constructed at his Crampton Street residence.

Probably the last place that you would expect to find a bowling green in Wagga would be on the steep slopes of Beauty Point. This was, however, the case during the 1950s when a Mr Fitzgerald built a bowling green at his residence at 11 Beauty Point Avenue. The Beauty Point Bowling Club was opened to the public in 1952 and included a clubhouse located in a large room underneath the house.
