Talk about The Conversation

Last month we invited Sunanda Creagh, the NSW Bureau Chief and Digital Storytelling Editor at The Conversation, to talk to researchers about writing for The Conversation. In this engaging session, Sunny spoke about the value of sharing your research with the public, which can go way beyond the number of reads of your article. Academic experts who write for The Conversation are frequently contacted by the media after writing an article, and this exposure can boost your public profile and engagement with business, industry, and other professional networks.

How do you go about getting published in The Conversation? The first step is to pitch your idea to the editors. The Conversation Australia has 18 section editors who receive hundreds of pitches daily – so your pitch must be good!

New Travel Grants Scheme

The Research Office has launched a new travel grants scheme for HDR candidates. The scheme includes two categories of grants:

- Conference Travel
 - The Conference Travel Grant provides financial assistance to HDR Students to attend an academic conference and present their work during the course of their candidature.
- Equity Travel
 - The Equity Grant is open to those who can demonstrate financial need e.g. geographical isolation, restricted access to other, funding opportunities. It provides funding for the following activities:
 - data collection, including conducting interviews in a field location,
 - travel to utilise equipment or resources not available at CSU,
 - access specialist archives, museums, libraries and galleries,
 - travel for required consultation with supervisor(s).

HDR candidates can apply for the grants at any time during the year. Applications will be considered by the Faculty Sub Dean Graduate Studies and approved by the Director of Research. There is a limited amount of funds allocated per year, and therefore, grants will only be awarded if funding is available.

A taste of some of June's PD

Great tools for use in your research to make visual and analytical inferences that would be nearly impossible to interpret from plain tables. Geographic Information Systems are computer based mapping and database systems that allow you to integrate and analyse spatial data (information about locations). The geographical data can include tables of information, images or vector representations of real-world entities, for example roads could be represented by lines and trees represented by points. The benefit of GIS is that you can then query all the tables and layers and perform analysis between and within all these forms of data (table selections, geographical proximity or other relationships).

Does your research involve other people? You probably need Ethics approval.



This workshop covers: Understanding who needs to make application and how to apply for approval from a Research Ethics Committee; the Codes which apply to your research and your ethics application; research integrity and the responsible conduct of research; ethical issues that may arise in your research; key questions you need to consider; and, tools to analyse and address issues.

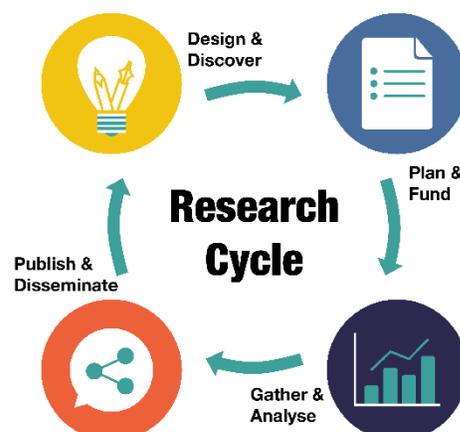

What Research Support can QCU provide?

The Quantitative Consulting Unit (QCU) provides statistical support to research students and staff across the University. QCU's core statistics support services include:

- Free general consultancy on statistical theory and application related to a research problem;
- Tutorials/training for learning and using analysis software such as R, SPSS, G*Power3.1, @Risk and Netica;
- Advice on, support to, and completion of statistical data analysis needed from a research project (e.g., for HDR students' studies, manuscripts for submission to a professional journal, proposal for grant application, etc.);
- Workshops for enhancing researchers' statistical data analysis skills – currently we are offering a **half-day R Introduction workshop** and a **one-day G-Power workshop**.
