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


Sam Bowker's USA Lecture Tour

ACT Government 2019/20 Priority Investment Program

The 2019/20 Priority Investment Program competitive funding round is now open to expressions of interest.

The Priority Investment Program (PIP) has been established to assist the ACT Government to work with like minded partners to achieve these objectives.

The PIP is aims to enable collaboration between the ACT Government, industry, research and the tertiary sectors to attract investment and grow established and emerging priority sectors of Canberra's economy. The PIP targets sectors of the ACT's economy that warrant a priority for investment including but not limited to cyber security, space, defence, renewable energy, agri-technology and plant sciences, healthy and active living and education, where Canberra has known and established strengths to capitalise on the rapidly growing global opportunities.

A funding round of \$2 million has been opened in the 2019/20 financial year and is available on a competitive basis to projects that:

Phillips KPA has been commissioned by the Australian Government Department of Education to undertake a project on **Expanding research collaboration between regional Australia and Southeast Asia**. The aim of the project is to expand the engagement of researchers in Australian regional universities with researchers in universities and research institutes in Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand and Viet Nam.

Funding is available for:

1. Up to ten travel grants of \$5,000 each for researchers from Australian regional universities to travel to partner institutions in Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand or Viet Nam to progress negotiations to reach agreement on the collaborative research proposed for the workshop(s).
