



Attraction to rural practice

On average, students rated their attraction to mid-career rural living and working significantly higher after their placement. There was no difference found in students' ratings when asked to consider their early years of practice.



Summary

- These findings provide important insights into rural placement experiences among students and are informing Three Rivers' activities to promote positive rural clinical placements.
- Overall, students report that their rural placements offer valuable opportunities for developing skills and confidence in clinical care.
- Against a backdrop of declining availability of some rural health services, there are concerns among students that this is impacting on the quality of learning experiences during clinical placements.
- While completing unpaid clinical placements presents a financial strain for many students, these may be
 particularly acute for those who are carers and family breadwinners. These students may benefit from a wider array
 of practical and financial support than are currently available.
