




THE IMPACT AND EXTENT OF SCHOLARSHIP DONATIONS

As we at BTCAA are trying to boost our bespoke Scholarship Fund to \$84,000 to make the giving of a Scholarship every year until 2051 (the centenary of the establishment of Bathurst Teachers College in 1951) possible, these tables may help to trigger a donation response to our very own Fund. This amount will allow a single scholarship to be given to a student undertaking an Education Course through CSU without having to do fundraising like has been done since 2001!! It will be self sustaining as investment returns (through CSU) will cover the cost. Who will be there???

This magazine is the third solely email and website version of our long-term 'Panorama' magazine. Prior to this it was both a mailed-out copy and also on the CSU website.

The big advantage now is that photos and pictures are in colour. Another bonus is that the magazine is not restricted to a multiple-of-4 size publication, an 8 pager or a 12 pager. It can be any size at all depending on content.

In this issue (#48) we have shown photos of this year's BTCAA Scholarship recipient, have an extended report and pics of our earlier 2025 AGM and Annual Luncheon as well as reproducing some of the photos used by the guest speaker, Stacey Fish, at this Luncheon. We also have a couple of articles from alumni, highlighting early years of life and society. I hope you find something of interest to read and enjoy, bring on memories.

Many of our recent "Panorama" magazines have shared Reunion Events, and stories from many about things that may have been of interest to readers. This has been also evident through all editions of "Panorama" since the originals in 1951.

However it is also becoming very evident that many of our alumni are ageing witness the 2022 BIG REUNION which celebrated 71 years since the birth of Bathurst Teachers College. It also celebrated 20 years of the BTCA Association. It was a multi-year reunion with over 100 at the Luncheon and 95 at the Dinner. These 'elders' (aka Pioneers) were into their late eighties and early nineties years of age.

Late last year (2024) in October there were two BTC groups that held significant reunions here in Bathurst ... the 1964-65 group celebrating 60 years since their first year as BTC students in 1964 and the 1968-69 group who were the last official BTC group before BTC was ended. As a result the usefulness of a regular "Panorama" magazine as a reunions 'flag' seems to be waning.

FYI – 'Panorama' is the longest lasting, continuous student/alumni magazine of any college or university in Australia. The first edition was published in 1951 as a student newsletter and they are still going today ... this one is #48 (numbered since 2001).

That is some history indeed!

DID YOU KNOW?

The College motto, "Doctus Doce" – was Latin for "Having been taught, Teach" it was adopted by the College in 1951..



VALE: KEN SHADBOLT (1952-53)

One of our long-term alumnus, Ken Shadbolt died earlier this year (6th February 2025, aged just 90



years old). Ken came to Australia from England after WW2, and could not believe his good luck in coming to such a paradise. He was a real 'larger-than-life' character who started at BTC in 1952. He was an avid writer, a member of the early production team of

the "Panorama" newspaper and a great BTC activity supporter. He was a very English gentleman, 'tall and scholarly'.

He did not stay with teaching but became a barrister, admitted to the Bar in 1968. He was also a travelling solicitor (judge) around many regional areas of NSW, and his stories about his alternative understandings of crimes and unusual judgments were always interesting and often very humorous. He did not follow the book, so as to speak.

During his student days at BTC he initiated and wrote some poems for a writing booklet called "Comment" This highlights, I think, his talent for literature and student writing

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Waves wash upon a rock, smoothing Surfaces pitted at birth, polishing Faces that reflect the dying waves, falling Back into the sea. In one brief second, flinging Its strength against the rock, leaving Its imprint before dying Back into the sea.

Do not mourn the waves that pass.

Waves follow waves without end
Only mourn the rock
Worn by pounding surfs
Crumbles, falls, and slips beneath the sea.
Dies in the merging greens
Buried in obscurity.** K. Shadbolt 1953



STORIES FROM OUR ALUMNI

The Tale of the Pineapple ... Ken Shadbolt

When Ken was a youngster (14yrs old) on his way to Australia after a hard time in London during World War 2, and after surviving on food only obtainable with use of Ration Books, he was presented with an interesting experience in Adelaide while on a ship from London to Australia in May 1949.

There ".....hanging from a hook outside an Adelaide grocers was the most exotic thing he had ever seen. This was a new world fruit resonant with new world promise a pineapple by his own reckoning... about the size of my head. The first thing he did was to buy that pineapple."

Spiriting it back onto the deck of the "Changsha" Ken proceeded to devour it in its entirety. A shocked purser passing by remarked ... 'You're not going to eat that on your own are you?' Ken fixed him with a steady gaze and replied 'Watch me!' he devoured it with gusto".

"This story was only recently told ... and when I asked him how it tasted I could see him take a huge swan dive into the recesses of memory to dredge up the only word that would do it justice. "I-n-c-r-e-d-i-b-l-e" he said with the kind of faraway look that lets you know it's coming from the absolute deepest well-spring of his psyche."

Ken was a deep thinker all his life ... and he has over time recounted many of his more humorous experiences as a teacher, as a legal expert, and as a friend and "Pioneer". He was indeed a raconteur extraordinaire. Vale Ken

HOW SOCIETY WAS WHEN THE FIRST BTC GRADUATES STARTED TEACHING

The Fifties --- by Royce Levi (1951-52)

"What a time to become a teacher! We were launched into our classrooms in 1953, amidst a decade of unprecedented change. There may have been greater changes later, but somehow the world seemed ready for them. Not for our struggling 1950's teaching generation: naïve some of us were, optimistic, yet many feeling like babes in the woods, struggling, with only two years of training, to find a way out of it. Life for us was Internet free, television free and our world was largely outsourcing free. That society was very different from today"

"We, the next teaching generation, had come through a war, in which we, the kids, were asked to be men and women, because the real grown ups were away fighting a war. We had seen our beaches impaled with steel spikes and barbed wire to prevent invasion. We had seen our railway stations deprived of their names to confuse the enemy. We knew blackouts and searchlights, planes towing practice targets, gunfire off the coast lighting the skies, submarines in our Harbour, rationing and shortages, American soldiers with stockings for our ladies and long months of waiting for news of our loved ones.

So when that war ended and that man danced with joy into eternity before newsreel cameras along a street littered with yesterday's headlines, we thought war would never happen again!"

"How were we to know that political opportunists would find ways of generating hatred and distrust and divide the world into two camps? How were we to know that fear of Communism spreading into China and North Korea would cause the Americans to land on the Korean peninsula on 19th July 1950?

"That was it then. When 1953 came and we said 'Good morning' to our first class, there were challenges outside our classrooms as well as inside them. A major war was raging still. Atom bombs were being tested like fireworks at today's football matches. And classes of 40 or 50, even 60 were considered acceptable because budgets had to be balanced.

All of this (and more) made teaching civics and morals in that first teaching year of ours, quite a problem. And somehow a bit of love and respect helped us through the darkness.

As for me, I was only nineteen...."

He Did But See Her Passing By.....

"The Queen was coming to Bathurst. She had been Queen scarcely longer than Pat Duesbury had been a teacher. It was an exciting time for everyone......"

"Excitement was rippling through the classrooms at Canowindra where Pat, in her first years of teaching, was enjoying the warmest support, from her Principal and his staff. The news of the Queen coming had come early in the year, and a train trip was in the offing. Some of them had never been on a train before.

Soon the day came. What an early start, 7am. How different it was from today. No bottle of water constantly available, no hat, no sunscreen, just 45 children bubbling with over with anticipation.

First a little motor train to Cowra. Then came the steam train to Bathurst. No corridors on this train, just the series of "dog-boxes" with isolated compartments with doors on both sides and not very comfortable seats. Children were swarming with growing numbers as stations came and went.

Then came Bathurst on the hottest of hot days. A swarm of numbers into the Showground. Finding the right spot. And then what seemed an eternity of waiting. It was so hot! Finally the cry came, "There she is!"

Along came the Land Rover. There was the Duke waving. And there beside him, in her buttercup yellow frock, was the Queen, small but in an aura of radiant beauty.

Soon the vehicle turned into the lane of the Canowindra children. Suddenly I heard a voice, "Miss, I want to go to the toilet!" Without further ado, the boy who owned the voice darted in front of the Land Rover and disappeared into the crowd opposite.

What a dilemma for a young teacher! There were 44 other children, suffering from the heat and becoming tired and even sleepy after such a long day, totally dependent on her Should she run after the boy, or trust him to come back? He did come back. And 44 sunburnt children, and 2 sunburnt teachers had seen the Queen!

There's a sequel too! This story was written in the local newspaper many years later and was read by the very boy who had passed by royalty in this unusual way. He came forward and revealed his identity. He himself had become a teacher and had similar trouble on an excursion. 'I am sorry Miss Duesbury, to have caused you so much stress and drama on that day, but I am pleased that you are able to remember your lovely little second class children."
