## ARC Discovery Indigenous Grant award – congratulations to Associate Professor Michelle Evans

Associate Professor in Leadership Michelle Evans, from CSU's School of Management and Marketing, has been awarded an ARC Discovery Indigenous grant of \$348,000 over three years, for her project examining Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians participation in major political parties.

"The findings promise to provide key insights into the recognised challenges faced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander members of major political parties as well as explore the emergence of Indigenous leadership in the Australian political system." Professor Evans said.

"Major political parties have agreed to participate in the project which will provide evidence-based research and policy advice on the advancement of Indigenous Australian party members into leadership roles and the collective leadership practices of grassroots Indigenous party members.

"We hope to make a very significant contribution to understanding and helping redress a key issue for Australian democracy."

The joint project with Dr Duncan McDonnell of Griffith University is the first large-scale study of the issue and will involve Australia-wide research and in-depth case studies."

## Researcher ID password

Do you have a [ResearcherID](#) with Thomson & Reuters? You may have received an email recently recommending you to change your password to your ResearcherID account (see image below). This was not a spam email, so please follow the instructions if you still have the email. If you have deleted the email, you can still reset your password through the [ResearcherID website](#).

### **Pitching CSU Research – Winners – Congratulations to Dr Kath McFarlane from the Centre for Law and Justice**

During the last week of October, fifteen CSU researchers competed in the first CSU heats of the Five Minute Research Pitch (5RP) competition. Each researcher presented a five minute presentation about their new or emerging research using only three PowerPoint slides.

The presentations demonstrated the broad range of exciting research currently being undertaken across CSU. With topics including falls among older people, educating against extremism, stabilisation of wastewater in ponds, engineering education and the effect of earthing the body on muscle soreness.

During each of the heats, presenters and audience members were located on three campuses. Therefore each contestant needed to simultaneously pitch to both a live audience and two remote audiences. The standard of presentations was very high with the judges having a tough choice in selecting the heat winners.

The overall winner of the Sciences and Health heat was Dr Abishek Santhakumar, from the School of Biomedical Sciences, who gave a presentation titled '*Antioxidants – Love for the Heart*'. Dr Randi Rotne from the School of Animal and Veterinary Sciences received the People's Choice award for her presentation about fractures in elderly animals titled '*Bone fracture repair and the effect on bone blood supply*'.

The winner of the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences heat was Dr Kath McFarlane, from the Centre for Law and Justice, who gave a presentation titled '*The progression of children in out-of-home-care in the NSW criminal justice system*'. Dr Sam Bowker from the School of Communication and Creative Industries received the People's Choice award for his presentation titled '*Art of the Egyptian Tentmakers*' which featured colourful slides of the artistic works.
