

## Community-University Partnership Grants

### OVERVIEW

The Charles Sturt University (CSU) Community University Partnerships (CUP) Grants are small grants (up to \$1,000) that the University awards to support regional programs within the following 5 categories:

**1. Arts and Culture**

Available to support artists in residence, art shows, musical education, talks and lectures, and any related activities that encourage engagement in artistic endeavours.

**2. Health and Wellbeing**

Designed to support the health and wellbeing of all people in our community. Grants can be used to fund projects and activities which enhance and promote healthy lifestyles, support mental health and general wellbeing.

**3. Sports Development**

Provided to registered community and sporting organisations to assist rural sportspeople or teams to attend regional, national or other one-off events, to assist community sporting groups to host regional, national or other one-off events in Charles Sturt University campus regions, costs associated with volunteer training and to provide equipment to assist those who have difficulty meeting the cost of participation in sports programs.

**4. Education Development**

To assist schools and not-for-profit early childhood centres in Charles Sturt University's rural and regional campus footprint to acquire equipment or consumables that assist to facilitate student learning and engagement with their schooling in rural and regional areas.

**5. Environmental Sustainability**

Support initiatives that aligns with Charles Sturt University's adopted definition of sustainability (see below) and will improve the environmental and social sustainability of Charles Sturt's regional communities.

Charles Sturt defines sustainability as being:

*Sustainability is a process that integrates environmental, social and economic considerations into decision making with the goal of creating a thriving and healthy society. Its focus is on improving the quality of life for all citizens without increasing the use of natural resources beyond the capacity of the environment to supply them indefinitely. Sustainability is based on a simple principle: Everything that we need for our survival and well-being depends, either directly or indirectly, on our natural environment.*

Applications should where possible demonstrate how the activity will support engagement with learning and further education.

## **ELIGIBILITY**

### **Who can apply?**

Registered community and sporting organisations as well as educational institutions (e.g. Schools) non-government organisations and service providers may apply for a grants under these categories. Individuals should apply through their relevant community or sporting organisation or educational institution. Eligible bodies must be incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation or association. Where a body is not incorporated, funding may be requested, with a letter of support from an auspicing body. The Grant Review Panel may at their absolute discretion, approve the award of a grant to a non-conforming body or individual where they are satisfied that the project meets the aims of the program and the grant is appropriate.

### **Are there any applicants that will not be considered for funding?**

In addition to any organisation that does not meet the criteria the application will not be considered for funding, additionally if an organisation has received funding from the University in a previous Community-University Partnership (CUP) grant round and:

- has not provided a report on that expenditure by the deadline agreed upon by the University;
- has not expended the funds in accordance with the grant purpose (or any variation agreed in writing by the University); and/or
- has not expended the funds by designated report due date.

The relevant Director of External Engagement may approve consideration and funding of an application from an organisation or body that has not met the requirements of a previous grant round where he or she is satisfied that the failure to meet the requirement was unavoidable, or there is otherwise a reasonable explanation. An explanation regarding any failure to meet the requirements of a previous round should be submitted with the application should the applicant wish the application to be considered further.

### **What can funds be used for?**

Funds may be used for a range of purposes related to the goals of the project as outlined below under each category:

#### **Arts and Culture:**

- Includes artists in residence, art shows, musical education
- Talks and lectures
- Related activities that encourage engagement in artistic endeavours.

#### **Health and Wellbeing:**

- Promoting the physical fitness, nutrition, mental and social wellbeing of the community,
- enabling those living in rural and regional areas to participate in activities which enhance their quality of life,
- providing access to resources and information to improve community awareness of health-related issues, and
- providing access or opportunity for the community to make healthier choices or participate in activities with a prevention focus that deliver real health and wellbeing outcomes.

### **Sports Development:**

- assisting a rural sportsperson or team to attend a regional, national or other one-off event;
- assisting a community sporting group to host a regional, national or other one-off event in Charles Sturt University's campus regions;
- the purchase of sporting equipment to assist young people who have difficulty meeting the cost of participation in sports programs;
- Costs associated with volunteer training.

### **Education Development:**

Including the purchase of equipment such as

- sporting equipment,
- musical instruments, arts and craft materials,
- scientific or technical instruments,
- communication and technology equipment (including software where this is integrated with the item),
- furniture, white-goods etc.

### **Environmental Sustainability**

- equipment and material purchases, educational workshops, catering. Activities that will not be funded include: consultancy fees, car hire or fuel costs, accommodation, subscriptions or software licenses.

## **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

### **Can Charles Sturt staff apply?**

Yes. Charles Sturt University staff are allowed to apply for projects unrelated to the University (e.g. Community Group). Staff can not apply for a grant to assist with Charles Sturt related projects.

### **Can the funds be combined with other funding?**

Yes. You can apply for a grant to meet part of the cost of your project. Where your application is for part-funding of a larger project that involves other expenditures, you will need to tell us the source of other funds (including if the other funds will be provided by your organisation) and whether this funding has been confirmed. The University may, in its absolute discretion, decide not to award a grant if other funding has not been confirmed, defer an application to a future year (subject to future funding), or make a grant conditional on other funding being confirmed.

### **Can a Sports Development grant be provided for training or development costs?**

Yes. Costs associated with volunteer training that demonstrates clear economic benefit and value to the club or wider community.

### **Is there anything I can't ask for funding to do?**

You may not ask for funding, or use funding, for the following:

- capital expenditure;
- debt reduction;
- ongoing operating expenses;
- indirect expenses that cannot be directly tied to the approved grant project; and
- lobbying (unless this aligns with a Government and Community Relations priority of the University).

### **Can the project continue beyond the period of the grant?**

Yes. However, projects that are intended to be ongoing beyond the period of the grant must demonstrate how the project will be sustained after the grant period (that is, how future expenses will be met). If the application does not demonstrate how the project will be sustained, funding may not be approved. Projects cannot rely on or expect to receive future funding support from the CUP program.

### **Will my application be considered differently if I have received funding from the University before?**

The University aims to support projects based on their merits, and previous applicants may apply for funding for new projects in subsequent rounds. However, where two or more projects are considered by the assessment panel, in its absolute discretion, to be equally meritorious the University may give preference to awarding a grant to an applicant that has not previously been funded to encourage the broadest benefit of the program for all our communities and stakeholders.

**Can a school that incorporates a primary, secondary and/or early childhood section (e.g. a central school) apply more than once with respect to each section?**

Yes. In many rural towns a central school may incorporate a primary and secondary section of the School. Some schools may also operate early childhood centres as well. The University allows primary, secondary and early childhood learning facilities to apply for funding separately in those towns where these functions are operated through different schools. It is only fair, therefore, that in towns where these functions are collocated or operated as a central school that these schools are able to apply separately for each of early childhood, primary and secondary schooling sections.

However, where an application is made for a section of a school (primary, secondary or early childhood) the application should generally relate to the purposes of that area. It is permissible for projects from each section of a central school to be related (e.g. each application relating to the purchase of equipment that may operate together), however, each application will be considered competitively and independently of each other, so each project for each section must be able to be completed separately.

Where a central school makes an application for a section, it cannot also make an application for the school as a whole in that round. It is suggested that central schools consider making separate applications with respect to each section.

**Can I apply for funding for a project located in, or for the benefit of, a non-rural or regional area?**

No. The CUP program aims to support rural and regional projects in the University's rural and regional footprint (within a radius of Charles Sturt University's rural and regional campuses). Grant funding is not available for projects that are predominantly located in, or for the benefit of, a major city or metropolitan area (even where Charles Sturt University has a campus or facility in that city) and is only available in Australia.

**How will the University decide applications?**

All applications will be assessed on their merits based on the:

- capacity for the project to meet the specific goals of the grant round to which the application has been made;
- audience reach of the project; and
- impact of the project.

Projects should be for activities that could not be reasonably funded by other means. The University may also take into account the capacity or appropriateness of the organisation to obtain funding from other sources for the project.

**If I am successful in receiving a grant, can I ask the University to change what I can spend the money on?**

The University may grant approval in writing, at its absolute discretion, to vary the purpose of the grant if it is consistent with the original terms of the grant.

## **How are funds allocated across Charles Sturt University campus regions?**

The University allocates a certain amount of available grant funds each year to CUP program. Grant applications in each campus region and round are then assessed against other applications in that region (not against applications in other campus regions). Where funds allocated to a campus region are unexpended in a grant round (for example, if there are insufficient qualified or meritorious grant applications from that region), the funds are reallocated to a central fund.

The Director may then decide to allocate the unexpended funds to another grant round in that campus region, or allocate the funds to another region where the number of grants applications is higher or where there is a particular project that is not funded but which delivers outcomes consistent with the aims of the program.

## **Are there any conditions on applications?**

Yes. The aim of the program is to provide small amounts of money to community organisations to facilitate beneficial outcomes for our rural and regional communities. The University aims to make the process of applying and administering the program easy, so that we do not end up spending unnecessary resources on administration that take funding away from community initiatives. The University therefore makes it a condition of application that the applicant agrees to the following terms and conditions:

- only applications through the University's online application process will be considered;
- the applicant acknowledges and agrees that the University has the right to award funding in its absolute discretion;
- the applicant acknowledges that the University reserves the right not to allocate funding, or to reallocate funding between programs, at its absolute discretion;
- the applicant acknowledges that the University will not be required or expected to provide reasons for its decisions;
- if a grant is awarded, the funds will be expended on the project outlined in the application unless approval has been granted by the University to a variation;
- the CUP program will be acknowledged during and after the completion of the project as detailed in the project application;
- the applicant will submit a project report to the University by the required date as outlined in the notification of application success.

## **What sort of acknowledgement should I provide?**

The grant application must provide a promotion plan showing how the CUP program will be acknowledged during and after the completion of the project. A report on the project must be provided to the University by the required date as outlined in the notification of application success, accompanied by photos and any receipts, including written permission for the University to use the photos in its promotion of the CUP program (remember to get permission from anyone in the photo as well).

The University may publicise or promote its contribution to the project in the media, Annual Report and other mediums, including through use of the project report. Approval to use the University's trade mark on any material must be obtained in advance by completing the Logo Request form found on the [Division of Marketing and Communication website](#).
