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Research Support: Statistics Support Officer for the Quantitative Consulting Unit

The Quantitative Consulting Unit (QCU) provides statistical assistance to CSU's research students. Some of the services the QCU can provide are:

- General statistical consultancy.
- Experimental and survey design.
- Planning experiments – Sample size, Power Analysis etc.
- Analysis – advice, support and completion of analysis.
- Workshops for people looking to enhance their statistical processing skills.

Through the QCU research Honours, Masters and PhD students are offered a free initial consultation to provide a kick-start to their research to ensure that they embark on a path that will lead to successful completion of their research. Preparation and design of your research project is paramount to your success.

The QCU facilitates an R user group meeting each month. These meetings will be continuing this year and we envisage that these meetings will commence as soon as the QCU is functioning at full capacity.

Once we commence these meetings and you would like to know what will be covered please go to the QCU – cRow webpage where the content and meeting recording will be uploaded.

The QCU is pleased to announce that we have fulfilled the full time position of Statistician, John Xie will be commencing with us on July 20. The QCU would like to welcome back Wayne Robinson as our temporary statistician until John commences, his assistance will again be greatly appreciated.

All QCU business will carry on as usual. Coral Moffat will still be in on Mondays and Fridays, so please do not hesitate to contact the QCU (qcu@csu.edu.au) or Coral to book appointments (cmoffat@csu.edu.au).

Our next face to face workshop will be organised as soon as we have our permanent statistician. The workshop is held over 4 consecutive days and includes morning/afternoon tea, lunch and workbook. Did you know you can now print a list of your publications from CRO. Simply log in to your CRO home page and display your publications.

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- **The Joys of Journal Rankings**

What are journal rankings? Journal rankings are used to measure and compare the influence of journals at journal level rather than article or author level.

Journal ranking information can be found using [SJR](#) (SCImago Journal & Country Rank), [Scopus Journal Analyser](#), [Web of Science](#) and [Google Scholar Metrics](#). Some journal impact factors may also be found on publisher's websites.

To find a journal ranking in [SJR](#), click on the link; type in the name of the Journal title (for example: "Journal of Educational Psychology"). Information about the journal will be returned; including H index value and Quartiles for the subjects the journal has been categorised into. Hover your mouse over the green squares of the years to find out what quartile the journal has been added to.

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- **Using academic social networks (ASN) without infringing copyright**

ASN (Academic Social Networks) such as Academia.edu and ResearchGate are popular places to share ideas, research and collaborate with fellow researchers (Van Noorden, 2014).

ASN encourage users to upload copies of published research, but doing so may infringe on the copyright agreement you signed with the publisher. You can avoid this problem by providing a link to a copyright cleared copy of the article in [CRO](#) (CSU Research Output). Alternatively, you can check the Publishers copyright policies using [Sherpa/Romeo](#), a searchable site of publisher copyright policies & self-archiving details, i.e. some publishes allow self-archiving of copies of an article at different points of the publication cycle, or after an agreed period of time.

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- **Updated, user friendly new interface for CRO**

The Library's research repository system, CSU Research Output or CRO, was recently relaunched using Elsevier's Pure and can be accessed from <https://researchoutput.csu.edu.au>.

This new version of CRO will help raise the profile of CSU's researchers and research outputs by displaying researcher profiles, publications and listings by Research Centre and School. Users will find it easy to create links to profiles and publications in CRO.

All legacy data and research outputs from the previous system have been migrated and are discoverable in this new environment.

Links to the old system are now obsolete. They have been changed where they are known but email signatures and links to content in Interact will need to be updated. If you find broken links please contact cro@csu.edu.au

Open access publications in the repository will still be accessible and easier to find using Google and Google Scholar.

From July, researchers will be able to add new records and edit researcher profiles. The new system has the facility to collect CSU publications from databases such as Scopus, Web of Science and Ebsco which

will save time entering publication data. Publication data will be transferred from CRO to MyResearch. Training and support materials will be available.

Have a look at the new [interface](#) and check out your publications.

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- **CRO, MyResearch and ROC?**

What's the difference?

- CSU Research Output ([CRO](#)) is the public showcase of our research outputs
- [MyResearch](#) is an administrative system where the publication data is processed for Government and University reporting (eg ERA) and is only accessible within CSU
- The Research Outputs Collection ([ROC](#)) is the name of the internal assessment of the outputs that have been collected in CRO

Who is responsible?

- CRO is managed by the Library
- MyResearch and ROC are both managed by the Research Office

The Library and the Research Office work closely to ensure the processes align and the publication information is collected only once.

Why do these systems or processes exist?

- CRO raises the profile of CSU's researchers and research outputs by displaying researcher profiles, publications and listings by Research Centre and School. Open access publications in the repository are accessible to the public and findable using Google and Google Scholar
- MyResearch is an internal central research information management system which allows for recording and monitoring a range of research activities, including research output assessments
- ROC assessment provides data that is used for the following purposes:
 - The Employee Development and Review Scheme (EDRS)
 - The inclusion of research outputs data for the purposes of academic promotion
 - External funding proposals: research environment
 - Maintaining profile against the Definition of Research Active
 - Faculty and School Reviews
 - University Research Centre reviews
 - Performance-based funding from DVC RDI including Compacts and Research Centre annual operating budgets
 - Meeting the Higher Education Standards Framework requirement for maintaining a system for "accurate and up-to-date recording of the research outputs of staff and research students"

Hard lessons still to be learnt: CSU cybersecurity experts



Cybersecurity experts at Charles Sturt University (CSU) believe Australian businesses suffering from the latest ransomware attack 'Petya' have not learned sufficiently from a previous global attack. "We haven't acted on the lessons learnt in the 'WannaCry' attack in May," said Associate Professor Tanveer Zia from CSU's [School of Computing and Mathematics](#) in Wagga Wagga. "Targeted organisations haven't fully protected their systems against future assaults with updated security 'patches'. "While this attack is no different to the 'WannaCry' attack, some cybersecurity pundits believe this new attack is worse

The [4th Cyber Security Symposium](#), hosted by the Cyber Security Research Group in Charles Sturt University's (CSU) [Faculty of Business, Justice and Behavioural Science](#), will explore and discuss innovations, research and experience in cybersecurity with industry experts.

Research group leader and symposium organiser Dr Rafiqul Islam said, "We want to develop ideas for solutions of current challenges that will support Australia's cybersecurity into the future. "The latest 'Wannacry' malware attack has focussed worldwide attention on cybersecurity and how governments and businesses can protect the data they store about their clients and customers."

Trust in juries and courts in the Age of Terror



A book co-edited and part-written by a Charles Sturt University (CSU) legal expert has addressed the complex challenges faced by courts in Western democracies trying terrorism cases.

Professor Jane Goodman-Delahunty, a leading researcher with the CSU [School of Psychology](#), said, "Terrorism has become an everyday reality in most contemporary societies. Bombs explode in popular venues, public buildings turn into fortresses and laws are tightened that threaten fundamental rights."

The Sydney-based academic believes that democratic practices such as the right to trial by jury are challenged in these cases by ethical, social and technological barriers.

Evidence questions 'common sense' about memory in child abuse cases

A Charles Sturt University (CSU) legal expert and her team have shown the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse that some views used to discredit victims of child abuse are not supported by current scientific evidence.

"We identified several common misconceptions about memory and compared these views with the opinions of memory experts and professionals working in the justice sector, including police, lawyers and judges," said Professor Jane Goodman-Delahunty from CSU's [Faculty of Business, Justice and Behavioural Sciences](#).

"A number of misconceptions about memory have been adopted by the sector, and normal memory functions and normal memory errors are routinely and unfairly used to discredit victims and cast doubt on all their testimony," Professor Goodman-Delahunty said.

"Examples include errors in recalling minor peripheral details, poor memory for details of recurring events, and recalling more information after an initial police interview."

The report, titled *Empirical Guidance on the Effects of Child Sexual Abuse on Memory and Complainants' Evidence*, was recently submitted to the Commission by a research team led by Professor Goodman-Delahunty, who is based at CSU in Manly.

Professor Evans spoke about her ideas on the role of our identities and why they matter to the work of leadership at the recent TedXFullbright event in Canberra on 6 July.
