Exploring Early Childhood Educator Well-being in Practice and its Relationship with Child Outcomes

Abstract

It is well established that early childhood education (ECE) programs have the ability to support long lasting, beneficial outcomes for children (Barnett, 1995, 2011; Burger, 2010; Curie, 2001). There is also evidence that the well-being early childhood educators may be interlinked with child outcomes, although there are currently major gaps in the literature. These gaps include (1) a lack theoretical framework explaining the relationship between early childhood educator well-being and child outcomes; (2) limited direct research on the relationship between early childhood educator well-being and child outcomes; (3) limited research on the well-being of early childhood educators overall, particularly in Australia; and (4) limited research overall involving children younger than three years of age in early childhood education contexts. The Early Childhood Educator Well-being Project (ECEWP) is currently underway to investigate the state of EC educator well-being. The proposed study is embedded in the ECEWP and will address the four gaps listed above. The research will conduct two studies. The first study (study 1) will draw on data from the ECEWP pilot study, to investigate the well-being patterns of early childhood educators in Australia. The second study (study 2) will re-visit pilot study participants to investigate the relationship between early childhood educator well-being and developmental outcomes for infants. Study 2 will also extend on study 1, by exploring how the well-being of the participants changes (if at all) over time. Overall, it is hoped that insights gained from this and future investigations will inform evidence-based policies and initiatives which support a robust ECE sector, with thriving educators, children, families and communities.

It improved my understanding of the interconnectedness of the decision chain through the various research and other committees and broadened my awareness and understanding of the various policies that affect HDRs.

The role provides the opportunity to put forward the HDR candidate's perspective to discussions that affect HDRs and HDR supervisors – for example in the content of the Faculty Research Forum held in 2018 - to ensure that the needs of HDRs are not lost in the discussions relevant to established researchers.

As HDR Representative, I was able to bring forward areas of opportunity or concern, to have these discussed and to gain support and input from the Committee for new ideas or issues that affect all HDRs, and then to disseminate this information to other HDRs.

During my time on the Committee, my focus as an HDR changed to be more outward looking, which helped me connect and feel more engaged with the CSU research community.

2018 ERA Results

A huge congratulations to colleagues working in the 0807 Library and Information Studies field of research. LIS have achieved a rating of above world standard in the 2018 results. This is a significant improvement from the 2015 rating for this area of research. Well done!

Congratulations to colleagues working in the Curriculum and Pedagogy (1302) field of research and in the Applied Ethics (2201) research area where they have maintained an above world standard rating. These are wonderful results!

Seven of Charles Sturt's broad fields of research were evaluated at world standard or above (ERA ranking 3 or above):

- Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences (ERA 4);
- Environmental Sciences (ERA 3);

University Research Committee Membership

Two FOAE researchers have been appointed to the **University Research Committee**:

Level B representative **Tamara Cumming** (SOTE)

Level C representative **Amy MacDonald** (SOE)

The role of the University's Research Committee is to:

- oversee development and implementation of the framework to ensure quality in research by higher degree courses and subjects;
- identify and oversee risks and solutions associated with the quality of research and research training;
- monitor compliance with the Higher Education Standards Framework (Threshold Standards) 2015, and receive and consider reports on this relevant to the Committee and ensure appropriate actions where required;
- receive and review annual reports of higher degree by research course performance which will include, at a minimum, attrition, progression and completion, and student feedback by cohort, including external benchmarking;
- oversee the schedule of course reviews for higher degree by research courses and receive and review course review reports;
- recommend to the Academic Senate approval of Courses and Subject Information Management System (CASIMS) course summary documents for new or major variations, deleted / suspended / phased-out and modified courses for higher degree by research courses and subjects;
- oversee relevant policies and procedures and make recommendations to the Academic Senate or the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research, Development and Industry) in accordance with the Delegation Schedule 01 - Strategy and Policy Delegations, including but not limited to policies and procedures for:
 - i. research integrity;

- ii. higher degree by research admission, candidature, and examination; and
- iii. higher degree by research training and supervision;
- a. oversee delegations related to admission, enrolment, leave of absence and higher degree by research courses (in the Delegation Schedule 09 - Academic and Course Delegations);
- b. receive and consider matters involving honours courses and subjects forwarded by way of extract from the University Courses Committee minutes;
- c. receive and consider reports on research integrity and research misconduct including allegations of misconduct;
- d. receive and consider minutes and reports from Faculty Boards and from the Higher Degree by Research Committee:
 - i. confirming that policy / procedure requirements have been met, especially in relation to the authority to approve final grades for subjects;
 - ii. addressing Higher Education Standards Framework (Threshold Standards) 2015 (HESF) responsibilities for orientation and progress, learning environment facilities and infrastructure, diversity and equity, learning resources and educational support and academic integrity; and
 - iii. identifying and responding to existing or emerging issues / risks and solutions; and
- e. receive and consider advice from, and inform, Faculty Boards on research and research training, policies and procedures.

Advisory Role

(8)The University Research Committee shall advise the Academic Senate on all matters relating to research performance and the academic governance of research training activities of the University.

(9)The University Research Committee may refer any item to the University Courses Committee and / or the University Learning and Teaching Committee for discussion, consideration and / or action, and may refer relevant matters for action or noting to other committees or officers as appropriate.

Do you have goals for writing, reading, data analysis or other things which need your focus?

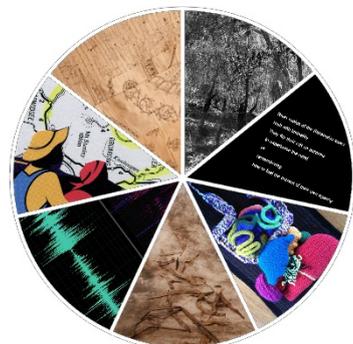

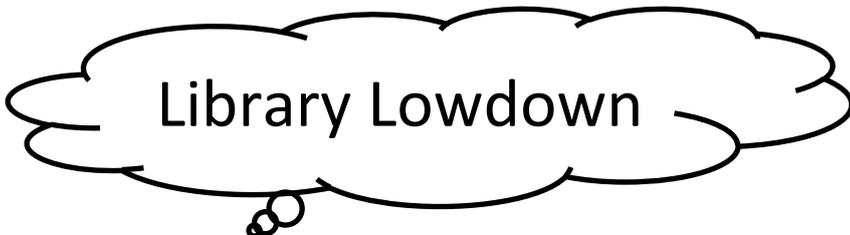

New Library Guide – CRO: Recording Research Outputs, Impact and Engagement

Are you updating your CRO profile and not sure how to go about it? Need to get your publications in for the CSU Research Outputs Collection (ROC)? Want to know more about your CRO profile and how to get the most out of it?

The Library has created a [guide](#) to help you navigate your way through your CRO profile and to get the most out of it:

[Getting Started](#) – looking at who can have a CRO profile, information about logging in, your personal overview, the h-index, tips on promoting your research, information about PlumX and the downloads information to creating lists of your works.

[Your profiles](#) – looking at CRO and ORCID. Watch this space for further information about why an ORCID profile is so important. This section will give you tips on what to include in your profile, how to edit it and linking your ORCID profile to CRO. It also details how to get help from your friendly [Faculty Liaison Librarians](#).

[Adding Research Outputs](#) section shows you what templates are available and how to use them. It will give you some great tips and tricks for filling them out. It gives you information on adding content to the CRO repository. Shows you how to import files, information from online databases and Google Scholar. Shows you how to link your publications to activating and if you need it; how to edit or delete works.

[Creative works](#), do you have some and are not sure how to add them – then this section can answer your questions. From how to submit them to looking at Copyright and Sensitivity considerations.

[Thesis submission](#). Want to know how to go about it? This section includes some great quick tips for filling out the form.

[Activities or Engagement](#) will give you information on what this is, why you would use it and what to include.
