I had never given any thought that this "City" kid would be sent to a remote town in country NSW to take up my Teachers' Scholarship. So it was with a degree of anxiety and apprehension that I returned my formal acceptance of the offer to that large and stately build-

ing in Bridge Street, Sydney.

The obligatory "Medical Examination" was duly undertaken as almost a military style operation. We even had to do a "Full Monty" with nurses (no male nurses then) supposed to watch the collection of urine specimen to prevent substitution trickery my group failed that one and we were then allowed to enter privacy cubicles one at a time to perform the deed - but still carefully but discreetly supervised!

At the end of February, 1956, I received a free rail pass to travel on the "Riverina Express" to Wagga Wagga. On boarding the air conditioned train I looked for others who might be going to the same destination but to no avail.

At the station I decided to catch a taxi and arrive in style. On arrival at the College Office I was informed that I was the last to arrive and the "Dorm Warden"

A new friend, who later was our Best Man at our Wedding in 1960, already knew many of the students, and kindly arranged to

sit with me at one of the "l--o--n--g" tables. Everyone was standing behind a chair, including the Lecturers at the "Top Table". A little time later a hush of silence fell over the crowd as the Principal, George Blakemore, arrived with a friendly wave to all. Then, "Grace" was said for the multitude followed by a cacophony of hundreds of chairs legs scrapping the floor as we well-mannered men assisted the nearest female student with her chair.

A steep learning curve was taking form with all these new ways of doing things - and then another surprise - young waitresses were serving us with our meal! And then - another surprise at the end of the meal we just left the tables and again they were cleared by the waitresses! Dining in Style! I am starting to like this place!

For this city boy, I thought I was now living in luxury. The Schol-

- Wagga Wagga hurry. Late comers to meals had staff, and a monthly allowance of terials and small necessities for daily living! The Basic Wage for many in normal jobs was about twice as much so we were really very well provided for.

> After the evening meal we went back to our individual dorms where the Second Year Students took their time to explain to us some of the protocols we should follow to stay out of trouble. This was very much appreciated as we quickly grasped this new life, of freedom from parents, but at the same time learning acceptance of the restraints imposed on us by "College Rules".

> Quite suddenly this information session with personal discussions with our Second Year Dorm Housemates was interrupted with the appearance of the "Senior Swimming Lecturer" (in reality an older second year student posing as a lecturer) who managed to convince most of the newly arrived that he was the real thing! He required all new students (with a lot of support from the Second Year Gang) to meet him at the Town Swimming Pool at 6am the next morning!

CSU TO DEMOLISH OLD BUILDINGS

CRUMBLING buildings Charles Sturt University's (CSU) moved out at the end of last year. south campus will be torn down The future of those buildings will later this year as part of a longer- be in the hands of whoever buys term plan to sell off most of the the land they are on. 15-hectare site by the end of 2015.

Homes are likely to replace the dilapidated former teaching buildings within a few years.

A development application was lodged with Wagga Wagga City Council yesterday seeking permission to demolish 12 redundant weatherboard and fibro buildings.

CSU's executive director of the division of facilities management, Stephen Butt, said pending council approval the 50-year-old buildings would be removed by mid year.

There are no plans to demolish the brick accommodation blocks which are now empty.

Mr Butt stressed that buildings on south campus housing CSU regional archives, the Riverina Conservatorium of Music and Kay Hull Veterinary Teaching Hospital would be retained and will not be part of any sell-off at this time.

He said the buildings to be demolished were in very poor condition and presented a risk to safety.

Some buildings contain asbestos. "Reports have found the buildings have served their purpose and are now past the point of preservation, particularly as they are no longer used," Mr Butt said.

The demolition is part of a plan for CSU to eventually sell off all of the site, except for the build-

"We are going through a planning process to determine what the best yield is, and that is likely to involve rezoning, subdivision and sale," Mr Butt said. "It is most likely to be rezoned for residential housing."

A \$16 million student accommodation facility with 150 beds at CSU's Boorooma campus will open late next month.

Mr Butt said the university could now house 1300 students on its Boorooma campus.

The buildings to be torn down will hold some sentimental value for thousands of teachers who were trained at south campus when it was the Wagga Teachers College.
