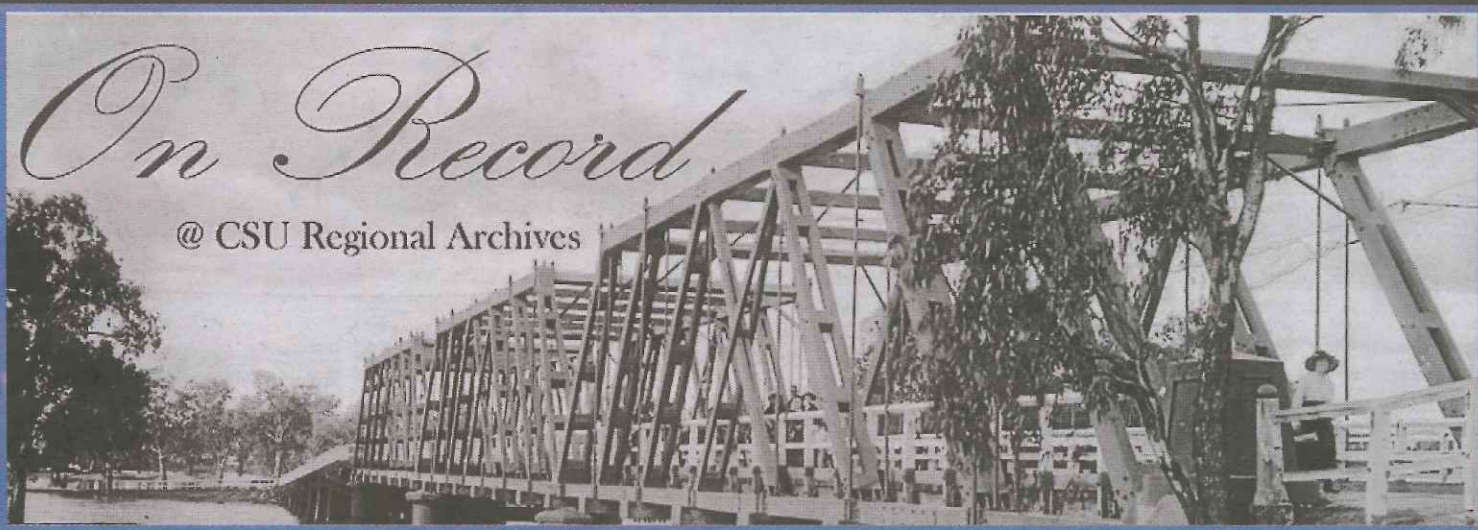


Saturday opening

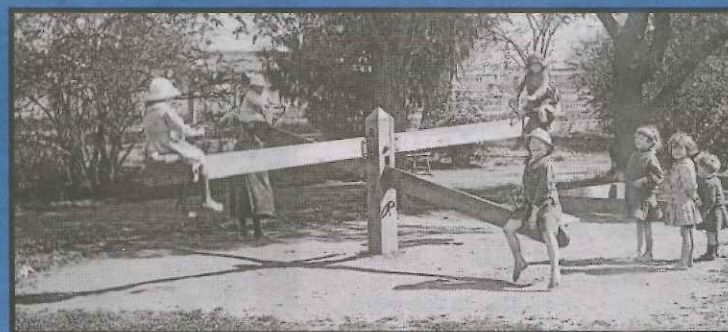
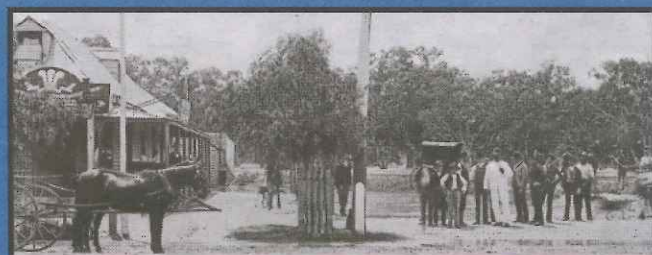
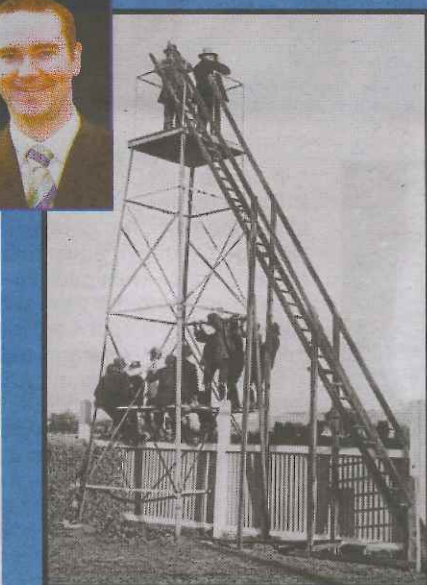
IF YOU'VE been thinking you'd like to drop in to the archives "one day", maybe that day is today. We will be open today from 10am until 3pm, so if you've got something you'd like to research or you're just plain curious about what we have, come in and see us.

The archives collection began in 1973 and has now grown to become the third largest university archives in Australia, with more than 4000 linear metres of paper, volumes, photographs and film. We collect material from a geographical area that stretches from Tumut in the east to the South Australian border and from the Victorian border all the way north to Temora and Hillston.

We have a huge range of historical records from all walks of life including sporting groups, schools, local politicians, media agencies, a few hospitals and emergency services, churches, police stations, local businesses, courthouses, individuals and families, and a wide range of community organisations.

Photographs

WE ALSO have an extensive collection of photographs, negatives, slides and film. Our search room is always open

for the public to browse through our photographs, whether for research purposes or just out of interest. Copies can be made from most photograph collections and we are always glad for help with identifying unknown faces and places.

House history

HAVE you ever wanted to find out the history of your property, the age of your house or maybe the first owner?

Shire council rate and valuation books can be a good source for

providing this information, particularly for older properties within town boundaries.

We have the Wagga Wagga City Council Rate Books from 1870 to 1949 on microform. We also have similar records for other shires in the Riverina such as Culcairn, Hay, Junee, Lockhart, Narrandera, Tumbarumba, Tumut, and Urana.

Newspapers

ONE of our most popular resources is our extensive collection of newspapers,

both on microfilm and in original hard copy.

Historic newspapers hold a wealth of information for anyone interested in what was happening in their community in the past.

The newspapers in our collection come from all over the Riverina, such as the *Tumut and Adelong Times*, *The Pastoral Times* (Deniliquin) and *The Border Post* (Albury). And of course, we have the *Wagga Wagga Express*, and a complete set of the *Wagga Wagga Advertiser* and *The Daily Advertiser* from 1868 to 2011.

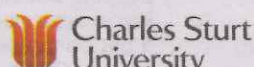
